#### <u>Prayer Ministry of Mt. Zion and Salem</u> Café Zion in the Car Rider Line

The first car came through at 1:54. We gave out 49 cups of hot chocolate - and this doesn't count the ones we drank when we were cleaning up! It was a very, very good hot chocolate mix. (I will ask Katie to order more for us as we used 2 of the 4 packets in the box of mix yesterday. We only gave out 7 bottles of water.)

We handed out 57 of the stuffed toy gifts for children and 23 of the small frisbees. Once the line started backing up, it was difficult to give out both or ask which one the parents thought the children would like. I didn't notice what time the last car came through, but we were finished and packed up a little after 3:00.

Three folks from Salem showed up; there were four "veterans" who I had asked, but three had doctor appointments for themselves or family members and one had a lingering cough that wouldn't go away. We had one new volunteer!

Although we could have used more helping hands and the day was quite chilly and windy, it was a wonderful afternoon! We had 21 prayer requests and 3 praise reports!

#### Praise Reports:

- A little girl thanked us for the stuffed animal.
- A young man expressed appreciation for us.
- I also had probably 4 or 5 people tell me how much they appreciated seeing us at the school; I just didn't record those encounters.

And the best one of all, Ms. K stopped in the parking lot after picking up her children. She got out of the car and told us that she usually was running late when we were out in the mornings but one morning, on Nov 9th, she had time to stop and get the coffee. She was so touched by our ministry and offer to pray for her that she called her mother when she got home. Her mother told her that was the 1st anniversary of her grandmother's death. Her grandmother was a devout Catholic and was always bringing her children, and then her grandchildren, to church when they were young. But as happens, her mother got busy with life and they stopped going to church.

Ms. K said she wasn't going to church with her children either but felt that our ministry was her grandmother's way of telling her she needed to get back to church, to seek the Lord. We joined hands with her and prayed over her. It was such a beautiful moment with the Holy Spirit in the midst!
