- When I hear sirens, I pray for the first responders and the people involved in the situation they are responding to.
- When sitting on my front porch or at a stop light and see cars on the road, I pray for them: nothing specific since I don't know them, but I pray for God to get them to their destinations safely and that they feel His presence and for God to bless them.
- When I see coins on the ground, I'll pick them up and pray for blessings for the next person that might find them and then put them back on the ground.
